Throughout your response you must **evaluate** how Kenneth Slessor represents the paradoxes of the persona's behaviour and motivations in TWO poems set for study as well as ONE related text.

You will have <u>50 MINUTES</u>, plus <u>5 MINUTES</u> reading/planning time to complete the task.

#### **Support Material:**

You will be permitted to bring with you into the examination room <u>ONE A4 page</u> (front and back) containing a proposed essay plan/structure; including support references or quotes, to assist with your response. Complete paragraphs or blocks of written information <u>are not</u> permitted as part of the support material.
