What's happening in the classroom?

Through the study of English students learn about the power, value and art of the English language for communication, learning and enjoyment. Developing proficiency in English enables students to become confident communicators, critical and imaginative thinkers and lifelong learners. They develop their language skills through activities involving speaking and listening, reading and writing, and viewing and representing. They learn about language and literature through working with a wide range of print, spoken, visual, media, multimedia and digital texts. This semester in English, students are completing the following units/modules:

Year 7

Term 1 – 'Seeing Through a Text' – In this unit, students learn to understand how visual language is used to tell stories, inform and persuade audiences, and convey perspectives.

Term 2 – 'Our Heroes' – In this unit, students examine what it means to be a hero and how different text types represent the concept of heroism.

Year 8

Term 1 – 'Australian Poetry' – In this unit, students develop an understanding of the ways composers use and experiment with the textual forms and features of poetry to express ideas and position readers.

Term 2 – 'Write Before Your Eyes' – In this unit, students engage in reading a range of quality texts to challenge their thinking, promote interest and enjoyment to support extended written personal response.

Year 9

- Term 1 'Australian Identities' In this unit, students deepen their understanding of how language forms and features are used in narrative by responding to and composing a range of different textual forms to engage with and understand the concept of identity within the Australian context.
- Term 2 'Poetic Purpose' In this unit, students develop their appreciation of how poetry allows composers to experiment with language, form and style for a specific purpose and audience. Students study a collection of war poems and analyse the ways the texts affirm or challenge diverse and complex perspectives and experiences.

Year 10

Term 1 – 'What Matters to Me?' – In this unit, students evaluate the representation of contemporary youth issues and experiences in a range of nonfiction and multimodal texts. They analyse how contextual and creative influences shape the understanding and interpretation of these issues and experiences. Term 2 – 'The Tragedy of Macbeth' – In this unit, students engage in an exploration of "Macbeth" by William Shakespeare, exploring the language of Shakespeare through physicality and movement. **Year 11 English Extension**

• Module - Texts, Culture and Value – 'Power and Morality – The Ambiguity of Evil' – In this module, students examine the ways in which aspects and concerns of texts from the past have been carried forward, borrowed from and/or appropriated into more recent culture.

Year 11 English Advanced

• Common Module - 'Reading to Write' - In this module, students undertake the intensive and close reading of quality texts from a variety of modes and media. In doing so, they further develop the skills and knowledge necessary to appreciate, understand, analyse and evaluate how and why texts convey complex ideas, relationships, endeavours and scenarios.

• Module A – 'Narrative that Shape our World' – In this module, students explore a range of narratives from the past and the contemporary era that illuminate and convey ideas, attitudes and values. They consider the powerful role of stories and storytelling as a feature of narrative in past and present societies.

Year 11 English Standard

- Common Module 'Reading to Write' In this module, students undertake the intensive and close reading of quality texts from a variety of modes and media. In doing so, they further develop the skills and knowledge necessary to appreciate, understand, analyse and evaluate how and why texts convey complex ideas, relationships, endeavours and scenarios.
- Module A 'Contemporary Possibilities' In this module, students extend their knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the ways that different communication technologies shape the ways that we read, navigate, understand and respond to digital, multimedia, multimodal and nonlinear texts.

Year 11 English Studies

- Mandatory Module 'Achieving through English' In this module, students develop an understanding of, and practical competence in, the use of language that allows access to opportunities in schooling, training and employment.
- Module F 'MiTunes and text' In this module, students develop a deeper understanding of how language is used in a range of song lyrics to express emotions, attitudes, ideas and themes related to the human experience.

Year 12 English Extension

• Elective 2 – 'Worlds of Upheaval' - In this elective, students explore and evaluate textual representations of the experiences of individuals and communities seeking unity, certainty, solace, justice or restoration in periods of significant social and political change and upheaval.

Year 12 English Advanced

- Module A 'Textual Conversations' In this module, students explore the ways in which the comparative study of texts (The Tempest by William Shakespeare and Hag-Seed by Margaret Atwood) can reveal resonances and dissonances between and within texts. Students consider the ways that a reimagining or reframing of an aspect of a text might mirror, align or collide with the details of another text.
- Module B 'Critical Study of Literature' In this module, students develop detailed analytical and critical knowledge, understanding and appreciation of TS Eliot's poetry. Through increasingly informed and personal responses to the text in its entirety, students understand the distinctive qualities of the text, notions of textual integrity and significance.

Year 12 English Standard

- Module A 'Language, Identity and Culture' Language has the power to both reflect and shape individual and collective identity. In this module, students consider how their responses Henry Lawson's Shorts Stories can shape their self-perception. They also consider the impact texts have on shaping a sense of identity for individuals and/or communities.
- Module B 'Close Study of Literature' In this module, students develop an informed understanding, knowledge and appreciation of Peter Weir's The Truman Show. Through their development of considered personal responses to the film in its entirety, students explore and analyse the particular ideas and characteristics of the text and understand the ways in which these characteristics establish its distinctive qualities.

Year 12 English Studies

- Module C 'On the Road' In this module, students develop understanding and proficiency in the use of language related to travel, for example the language used by journalists, filmmakers and those in the travel industry.
- Module K 'The Big Screen' In this module, students develop a deeper understanding of and proficiency in the use of language and techniques related to films, exploring the ways in which language is used in the production, promotion, reception and criticism of films.
